Other than reading and times table practise, no weekly homework will be set. We are hoping by giving everyone choices that a selection of activities will be completed by pupils with support from family members.

<p>English - Royal Headlines: Create 3 dramatic gossip-style headlines about Anne Boleyn, just like in class. Use exaggeration, emotion, and powerful adjectives. (e.g. "Shocking Secrets at the Tudor Court!")</p>	<p>Science - Garden Safari: Go into your garden/local green space and list all the living things you can find. Sort them into groups such as insects, birds, plants, and invertebrates. Write 3 questions you still have about habitats.</p>	<p>Art - Print at Home: Create your own simple printing block using cardboard or foam. Print a repeating pattern using shapes inspired by Kandinsky (circles, lines, triangles). Use at least 2 colours.</p>	<p>PSHE Healthy Habits Challenge Create a "Healthy Me" poster showing 5 daily habits that help you stay clean and healthy. You must include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Brushing your teeth twice a day • Washing hands properly • Bathing/showering • Eating healthy foods • Something you do to look after your <i>mind</i> (e.g., reading, talking to someone, playing outside) <p>Add drawings and short captions for each habit.</p>

<p>Maths - Measure Hunt: Find 5 items at home and measure their mass (g) or capacity (ml). Put them in order from smallest to largest. Y4 Challenge: Convert each into kg/l.</p>	<p>English - Six Wives Cards: Make "Top Trump-style" cards for Henry VIII's wives. Include: Name, nationality, years married, fate, interesting fact.</p>	<p>Science - Leaf Detective: Collect 3-5 leaves from outside (or photos if unavailable). Carefully draw each one, labelling veins, edges and shapes. Then create a simple yes/no classification key.</p>	<p>Whole class Reading - Create a Tudor Mini-Book Make a tiny information book all about Henry VIII using what we've read in class. Include: A fact file about Henry's early life, A page for his hobbies (music, hunting, jousting), A page for his family, A page for one key event. You can draw, write facts, or add speech bubbles.</p>

<p>RE - How Does Working Together Help? Write a short paragraph or draw a comic strip showing two people from different faiths working together on a project (e.g., planting trees, collecting food donations). Explain: How this helps them learn about each other How it helps their community</p>	<p>Art - Colour + Sound: Kandinsky believed colours were linked to music. Listen to a calm song and draw shapes/colours that match. Then try with a fast song and compare.</p>	<p>English - Character Feelings: Write a short diary entry written by Anne Boleyn, explaining how she felt about the rumours spreading in court. Try to include one rhetorical question.</p>	<p>History - Make a Tudor Shield Create a coat of arms that <i>you think Henry VIII would choose</i>, based on what we've learned about his personality and interests. It could include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Music symbols • Sports or hunting images • Tudor roses • A motto (e.g., "Strength and Power")
